Introduction to *Untitled: forthcoming poetry collection* by Simon Maddrell

I am delighted to have my first collection forthcoming from Out-Spoken Press next February 2026. I was fortunate enough to have two TLC Free Reads —— one thanks to New Writing South in February 2022 and the other thanks to Arvon in February 2024.

The first working title, *Three Legs*, was reviewed by Ahren Warner who was so supportive and encouraging, which massively boosted my confidence. Of course, sometimes we have to prepare for more holistic critique but in this case I was lucky enough to get a range of very specific feedback, suggestions and edits that helped me hone many of the poems. Many went on to be published. It is however worth noting that Ahren said, *This is wonderful!* about my poem 'Back to the Soil' and I kept on kept on submitting it as it was also a poem I loved. Twenty-six submissions later it was finally published in the amazing *Gutter* (Issue 31, Feb 2025). The lesson, if one is needed, is to be persistent with what you believe in, especially if someone you trust convinces you that you aren't deluded!

Because the Free Reads have a word limit, I was unable to submit full manuscripts, so instead chose to include poems I was either less sure about or confident about but unsure why they weren't accepted for publication (whilst also being aware that some poems will always be more suitable for a collection than a single poem in a magazine). Simon Barraclough reviewed a selection of poems from what was now called *blue spine*. As with Ahren, there were some great specific suggestions, but I was also very taken by his advice of *less hesitation...more assertiveness...keep fresh and not too encumbered by philosophical meta-considerations*. It is poetry after all!

I'm excited about the next stage of working with the remarkable Anthony Anaxagorou of Out-Spoken Press. I'm certain we will be cutting the manuscript back in terms of poems and reconfiguring it, alongside a new title, I imagine. The collection is autobiographical, covering almost sixty years. Being a 'late starter' poet, it is perhaps unusual in the breadth of its scope. The book explores the shame of being queer and its redemption whilst also mourning the loss of my brother and other friends. The spine of the book is my HIV diagnosis and HIV stigma, prompting meditations on mortality and grief — and my love of gardening. The book finally develops into nature and eco-poems including human and other species extinctions. But it will be exciting

and equally instructive. My debut collection will contain only a handful of my pamphlet poems, and even though many have been published in magazines, it will still be an excitable meerkat that emerges from its nest.

in nineteen ninety-one I stepped out of my skin

for the first time there was a young man sucking a cock like he'd arrived back home at last -not in the sense of the seventies oblong blocks of Manx Ices, unwrapped and shoved into a round cone but more so that rocket lolly, you remember, wide at the bottom, ridged with a sweet-lipped tip of white chocolate. the nineties wonder at what dialling 0898 offered -- cool, fresh & wild for it

until just after that

moment of melting white,

hundreds & thousands flashed by

-- now too exposed

to survive so raw,

i crawled back into my skin, sagging

& dragging itself to the bathroom

-- then I threw up.
